1. Find the article in “Search Everything”.

B.B.<sup>1</sup> marks the first time in Canadian history that a child has three legally recognized parents. The decision has, as expected, sparked a variety of reactions--while some herald it as an advancement of lesbian rights and a welcome expansion of the concept of family, others lament it as an attack on traditional Canadian values and an untenable example of judicial activism. And yet, in a culture steeped in "best interests of the child," one wonders if a child can have too many parents. This is an issue which has surfaced in courts across the country, as well as across the United States and Europe. While only an appellate court ruling, and therefore not binding in other provinces, the judgment in A.A. v. B.B. does provide some guidance on the topic and may prove to be persuasive in other situations in the future. This paper will examine the issues raised in and by the "three-parent decision," how the Court purported to deal with those issues, and the potential impact for similar cases under the equivalent Saskatchewan legislation. While not an exhaustive review of the area in question, this case commentary aims to provide a springboard for discussion and debate.
